About the Commonwealth Peace Prize

The Commonwealth Peace Prize will be awarded every three years to a distinguished peacebuilder with a strong track record of faith and values-based engagement in conflict resolution, the promotion of social cohesion and sustainable peace.

Prize awardees will receive £50,000 to expand their ongoing work and efforts to inspire others.

For 2025, some of the extraordinary nominees for the Prize have been selected as Commonwealth Peace Prize Fellows. They form a cadre of multidisciplinary experts who will mentor and upskill young people across the Commonwealth's 56 member countries.

The Commonwealth Peace Prize is part of a multi-phase collaboration between the Khalili Foundation and the Commonwealth Secretariat to support and amplify peacebuilding initiatives throughout the Commonwealth.



The 2025 Commonwealth Peace Prize Winners



Rev. Dr James Movel Wuye and Imam Dr Muhammad Nurayn Ashafa are joint winners of the inaugural Commonwealth Peace Prize. The two religious leaders founded the Interfaith Mediation Centre in Nigeria nearly 30 years ago.

The Interfaith Mediation Centre, which now has over 20,000 members, reaches into militias and gives guidance to young people to prevent them from joining conflicts. They also train women, religious figures and tribal leaders to become civic peace activists.

As young men in the early 1990s they were on opposite sides of warring groups. However, after suffering losses in the conflict, a friend challenged them to choose between being agents of destruction or peace. Together, they now lead others towards the path of peace and reconciliation.

These two extraordinary peacemakers are being honoured by the Commonwealth Secretariat and the Khalili Foundation for their unwavering commitment to nurturing dialogue, understanding and justice.



Reverend Dr James Movel Wuye

Rev. Dr James Movel Wuye is the co-founder of the Interfaith Mediation Centre and the Assistant General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God Northern Nigeria. He is also a member of the Executive Council of the Christian Association of Nigeria North-West Zone. He has mediated in several interventions throughout Nigeria and in other countries around the globe.

In addition to the Commonwealth Peace Prize, his peacebuilding efforts have earned him numerous awards and recognitions, including honorary doctorate degrees from Boston University and the University of Glasgow. He is also a sought-after speaker whose words have inspired many.



Imam Dr Muhammad Nurayn Ashafa

Imam Dr Muhammad Nurayn Ashafa is co-founder of the Interfaith Mediation Centre and founder of the Ashafa Relief Foundation. Both organisations focus on peacebuilding, interfaith dialogue and community development.

Through the Ashafa Relief Foundation he has provided humanitarian aid, education support, medical assistance and economic empowerment to vulnerable communities across Nigeria. A global advocate for faith-based conflict resolution, he was recognised as one of the 500 most influential Muslims in the world in 2009. He also holds honorary doctorate degrees from the University of Massachusetts and the University of Glasgow.

The Interfaith Mediation Centre

The Interfaith Mediation Centre is a Nigerian organisation that was created 30 years ago to promote trust and tolerance between Christian and Muslim communities. The centre aims to create a peaceful society in Nigeria and beyond, using a faith-based approach.

Their peacebuilding efforts have been featured in various documentary films on forgiveness and reconciliation, which have been showcased to global leaders at the United Nations headquarters, the UK House of Commons and other high-profile fora. One film, *An African Answer*, supported by the United States Institute of Peace and the Initiative of Change UK, documented their mediation efforts in Kenya following the 2008 post-election tensions.

Rev. Wuye and Imam Ashafa have worked extensively in Nigeria and other African countries including Sudan, Somalia, Ghana, Burundi, Chad and Kenya. They have also provided training and spoken internationally to promote peace, transform lives and inspire others.

They have received several international honours in addition to the Commonwealth Peace Prize, including the UN Gold Prize for World Interfaith Harmony Week and the Hessian Peace Prize, both in 2013. The peacebuilding duo were nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2014, and were finalists for the 2022 Opus Prize. They also received the inaugural Fondation Chirac Prize for Conflict Prevention in 2009 and numerous other local, regional and international awards.

They have also co-authored several books and research papers on interfaith dialogue and conflict resolution, including *The Pastor and the Imam: Responding to Conflict* and *Forgiveness and Reconciliation: Islam and Christian Perspective*. As a complement to their work, they also champion the re-greening of communities with autochthonous peace trees.
